From the Pastor



Traditionally, for the December newsletter, I'd write something about the four themes of Advent - Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. But we'll be talking about them each Sunday in December, so I'm choosing to use this space to instead to provide some information about the commitment of the church to offer the opportunity to read Through the Bible in a Year in 2025. Decades ago, St. John UCC made the decision to go with the NRSV version of the Bible – this is what is in our pews, this is what is used for preaching and for Bible Stud-

ies. The New Revised Standard Version of the Bible, or the NRSV, first appeared in 1989 and has received wide acclaim and broadest broad support from academics and church leaders. The NRSV translation was prepared by the National Council of Churches, a religious organization currently consisting of 35 Protestant, Anglican, Orthodox, African-American and historic Christian denominations in the United States, and is widely regarded as a leading force within the ecumenical movement of Christianity. A major revision, the New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition (NRSVue), was released in 2021. (this version is not in our pews).

Now that you are totally captivated, let me throw a monkey

wrench into the works – starting January 1, 2025, with 'The Daily Bible', we will no longer be using the NRSV version, but will switch to the NIV. The New International Version (NIV) is a translation of the Bible into contemporary English. Published by Biblica, the complete NIV was released on October 27, 1978 with a minor revision in 1984 and a major revision in 2011. The NIV relies on recently-published critical editions of the original Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek texts. "The Daily Bible" that we've used in the past and will use again next year, is provided in the NIV.



Again, now that you are totally enthralled with this vital information, let me clarify why this may (or may not) be important to you. Broadly speaking, the NRSV is a more liberal, inclusive version, and the NIV tends to be more conservative. To show you an example, compare these texts from Genesis 1:

NRSV: So God created humans in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

NIV: So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

"Humans" vs "Mankind" – is it a big deal? Maybe, maybe not. But it is worth noting, I think, that we are making this switch. Because if there is a word or phrase used that makes you feel uncomfortable, or it feels a bit 'male dominant', please be aware that this is because we are using a different translation of the Bible. As a society, I think we are a good path of more inclusiveness and acceptance, and I wouldn't want the choice of a Biblical translation to set us back. So, when these words or phrases come up, let's talk about them, acknowledge them, and together seek to find the Light of Truth that they contain. Perhaps we'll even have some after worship discussion over lunch sometime!

No matter the version, I hope that God's Word will continue to speak to your heart, be the basis for our worship, and serve as our Basic Instruction Before Leaving Earth (B.I.B.L.E.)— and I look forward to reading Through the Bible in a Year with you in 2025!

Blanck Studio has completed all the restoration work on the Christ Ascending stained glass window and we are so very thankful for all their work on this project. In fact, it looks so good that we are leaving the lights on over the choir area in the sanctuary so that

the window is visible evening and nights to the surrounding neighborhood over the weekends. It is truly impressive when seen from the outside. Blanck Studio has also indicated that the windows on the sides of the sanctuary are in good shape and are not in any urgent need of restoration. Again, thanks to everyone who helped support this project in so many ways.

Tuck pointing continues every week and progress is being made. Work should be completed by the end of November with several days of cleanup afterwards.

There will be no official WorkShip Day this month. However, there will be a list of small projects posted at the church for anyone to view and choose something on which to work. Just let us know what you would like to do and we can provide the necessary information, materials and advice to get you started.

We continue to work on the development of a new sign with a digital message board to replace our aging sign on Jefferson Avenue.

We are working with a local sign

company with the final details, drawings and costs. This will require a permit and a presentation to the Reading Zoning Board of Appeals and to the local neighbors in hopes of receiving approval. Along with this project we are receiving proposals for a new front entry to replace our battered and leaky doors. We are so very thankful that these projects can be funded through the undesignated funds that we have received from the estates of our members who have passed away.

The Ministry Spending Plan, otherwise known as the budget, has been generated for the coming year. With the help of all the boards, our Treasurer, Kathy Culver, and knowing that we have reached our Stewardship offering goal through your pledges, we have again developed a plan that meets all our needs with minimal supplements from Memorial Endowment. We hope for Council's approval in December and congregational approval at our annual meeting in January.
